We would like you to speak and we would like you to listen, and we also hope you to take the opportunity get to know our country a little better.

But in the end, the success of this conference will not be measured by what goes on during these three days here in Akureyri; it will be measured by what we take back home with us, each and every one of us. It will be marked by how determined we are, across borders, as fellow parliamentarians, at a time of great drama in the life of our planet, to actually go home and put what we say and proclaim, into action. Ours is, and continues to be, an opportunity to actually make a bit of a difference.
